

Overall Rules & Regulations for the Three County Fair

1. The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules at any time and reserves the sole final right to interpret all rules and regulations, and to decide all questions arising therefrom or in connection with the fair.
2. The superintendent will direct the arrangement of articles or animals in exhibition in his or her department. He shall give such instructions to awarding judges or committees as will result in judicious action and decide all questions governing the department.
3. Each superintendent is charged with caring for and returning the entry book of his department with the awards on each article duly and properly entered and the signature of the judges in each entry book of the department which he or she places awards, as premiums cannot be paid unless this is done.
4. Any class having only one entry will receive prize money and ribbon according to the merit of the entry. When there are only two entries in any one class, both owned by the same exhibitor, ribbons and prize money will be given according to the merits of the exhibits.
5. Exhibitors may show in all classes but are limited to no more than one entry in any one - lot. (no entry is eligible to be shown in more than one class except for special classes in Beef-grand Champion). Any one animal may be shown in only one division.
6. Each organization or individual exhibiting will be required to furnish their own materials and labor for building shelves, racks, signs, etc. No materials of this nature will be furnished by the Fair association.
7. All entries to the Three County Livestock Show and Fair are free, horse show entries do have a fee. See Livestock rules and regulations for details.
8. All property of every character entered for competition or display or any other purpose for being on the fairgrounds shall be subject to the control of the superintendent in charge, but in no case shall the Three County Livestock and Fair association or the secretary or any of its officers or members be held responsible for damage or injury of any character to such property while the same is on the fairgrounds, or at any other time.
9. No claim for injury of any person or property shall ever be asserted nor suit instituted or maintained against the Three County Livestock Show and Fair association, its officers, or their agents, on behalf of any person, firm or corporation, representatives, servants, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on the fairgrounds or occupying any space thereon.
10. All family and consumer science exhibits must be entered between the times of 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Monday, September 20, 2021 and remain until Sunday, September 26 at 1:30 pm. Livestock and poultry, which will check in from 2:00 pm - 6:00 pm on Wednesday, September 22, 2021 and may be removed after 8 p.m. on Saturday, September 25, 2021 after the awards. Rabbits will be entered prior to the rabbit show on Monday, September 20 and will be removed immediately following the show. Horse show check in will begin Saturday, September 11 at 11 am.
11. Any exhibit removed early (before stated date and time) will forfeit any cash premium won.
12. The Three county Livestock Show, and Fair association will rent booths or space for political purposes during the fair, but politicking is restricted to the booth space.
13. Exhibitors will be required to keep their space and stalls in a clean condition by removing all filth and litter and placing it in the designated places for such waste.
14. Premium checks will be issued by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Fair association.
15. Sweepstakes (Best of show) exhibits may be eligible to be entered at the Arkansas State Fair. Check with fair officials to see if your entry is eligible.
16. Commercial and service booths are approximately 8' x 8'.

Livestock Rules and Regulations - Three County Fair 2021

These rules apply to all animal divisions. pre-register your entries for priority penning and to ensure space is available. all entries must comply with Arkansas health requirements.

1. All exhibitors (Junior or Open) must have owned and taken possession of their animals at least thirty (30) days prior to the opening day of the fair.
2. All exhibitors must be residents of Cross, Jackson, or Woodruff county or their immediate family operating lands in these counties, or be a member of 4-H or attend schools in these counties.
3. Junior division exhibitors may exhibit following their 9th birthday thru their 19th birthday or one time following graduation from high school, whichever occurs first. Exhibitors under 9 may enter division as open exhibitors.
4. All livestock divisions are open to any pure breeds and non- registered commercial animals.
5. Livestock may be entered in the Open or Junior show. The same animal cannot be entered in both shows. Any one animal can only be shown in one division.
6. All Junior exhibits must be shown for judging. All animals must be exhibited in the show ring or designated area to receive premium money. Open exhibits not shown will have premiums reduced by half.
7. Animals will be placed according to merit at the discretion of the judge. Animals with no competition will receive awards on the basis of individual quality and type. Breeds with less than 5 head and 2 exhibitors may show as "All Other Breeds"
8. An Exhibitor can only show two animals in any one class for premium, and not receive more than one premium in any group class.
9. Exhibitors shall care for, guard, protect and preserve their exhibits, as Three County Fair does not undertake to do so and shall not be held responsible for any loss or damages.
10. Poultry and rabbit entries will be fed and watered by the Fair. (Exhibitors may volunteer for a shift for community service and leadership credit.)
11. All exhibits and exhibitor areas must be maintained suitable for public viewing. Grooming and grooming equipment in designated areas only.
12. Fair management reserves the right to limit or refuse entries based on space availability or exhibit educational purposes.
13. The decision of the judges shall be final, with no recourse.
14. All rules and regulations herein are subject to change without notice.

15. LIVESTOCK SCHEDULE

Sep 11 Fair work day and poultry blood test, 9am - noon

Sep 18 Horse Show check in begins 11 am, show noon

Sep 20 Rabbit check-in by 6:30, show 7pm

Sep 21 Livestock check-in 4 pm - 7 pm

Sep 23 Livestock show begins at 9am.

Sep 25 Livestock and Poultry Awards 5pm, animals released after awards.

September 26 Checks available 1:30-3 pm. All livestock must removed by 2pm.

Entry and Arrival: limited pen and barn space available, with priority given to pre-registered exhibitors. Late arrivals must be cleared 48 hours in advance with livestock superintendent. no early releases, early departure will result in premium forfeiture. Any animals left on fairgrounds by 2 pm Sunday will be confiscated.

Judging: All judging will take place on Thursday. Times posted evening before show day.

Champion Herdsman: Champion Herdsman competition will be open to youth exhibitors ages 9-19. Overall winner will be awarded a custom belt buckle. Judging will take place throughout the week. Points earned based on condition of animals in stall(s), identification of 4-H, FFA or other group, identification of exhibitor, cleanliness of animals, aisles and stalls, exhibitor participation, attitude of exhibitor, general appearance of stall area (tack, displays, etc). Judges will be unknown and may inspect anytime, day or night.

Showmanship: Showmanship competition will be open to youth exhibitors ages 9-19. Awards will be given in Cattle, Goat, Poultry, Sheep, Swine and Rabbit divisions. A junior and senior winner will be determined. Those winners will receive a ribbon. An overall winner in each category will be selected. This overall winner will receive a custom belt buckle.

Checkout: Entries released Saturday after awards.

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Checkout: Animals release after each class.

Exhibition Health Requirements: Livestock, Poultry, Exotics

General Requirements

1. Certificates Of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permits: “certificate of veterinary inspection” refers to a legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin) by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet health requirements of the state of destination. it must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. entry permits are required on all swine, and on cattle (steers exempt) from class B and C states only. Permit numbers can be obtained from the state veterinarian’s office (501) 907-2400 from 8:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday

a). Must be available on request by animal health officials.

b). Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, and registration number or ear notch. steers should be identified by description.

c). Show required tests and/or vaccination.

d). Show name and address of owner or exhibitor – this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.

2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infections or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm, lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis will not be permitted to exhibit.

3. All animals entering the grounds, including those shown in pet zoos, children’s barnyard animals, old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet requirements of their particular species.

4. All animals originating out of areas quarantined because of other diseases (vesicular stomatitis, scabies, etc.) shall not be permitted to enter the state.

5. The Fair Board reserves the right to have a blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any animal.

6. Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of any animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition. Their name and the lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA & FDA for further investigation and possible prosecution.

7. Disclosure: any animal receiving medication for any life threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered in the fair.

Arkansas Livestock County, Jr. District, District, State Fair Level and Other Shows

1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pets zoos, children's barnyard animals, old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
2. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 90 days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

Arkansas Cattle

1. If Arkansas is a class Free state, Arkansas cattle are exempt from brucellosis testing. if Arkansas is not a class Free state then the following testing requirements must be met: negative brucellosis test within 90 days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls 18 months of age and over. all heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. animals originating from a certified Brucellosis Free herd are exempt if the certified Free herd number is shown on certificate.
2. All heifers that are 4-12 months of age shall be vaccinated before entering the show.
3. Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 1985, that are over 12 months of age and are not official calf hood vaccinates will not be allowed to show (unless they are from a Brucellosis certified Free herd.) This will not apply if Arkansas continues as a Brucellosis Free state.
4. All rodeo stock exhibited at a rodeo in Arkansas must meet the out of state requirements for brucellosis and tuberculosis for 12 month and older bulls, roping and dogging steers, and heifer even if the rodeo stock originates from Arkansas. Tie down roping calves are exempt from the tuberculosis testing

Arkansas Swine

1. As of July 1, 2001, all swine must have an official premise identification.
2. Animals 6 months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within 90 days of exhibition or originate directly out of a validated herd, with validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested.)
3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within 90 days of the exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originate directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free herd, with Qualified herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

Arkansas Sheep and Goats

Exhibition officials must maintain records of all sheep and goats that are exhibited for a period of five years, to include:

- a) Identification number

b) Flock status as defined by the voluntary Flock certification Program

c) The name, complete address and phone number of the owner. all instate sheep and goats in the state of Arkansas must be identified by an official USDA tag (scrapie tag) or for goats a legible official goat registry tattoo if accompanied by a registration certificate.

Fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel may examine sheep on grounds. any sheep showing clinical symptoms of scrapie shall be immediately quarantined in isolation and required to undergo any approved diagnostic tests and shall be consigned to slaughter or destruction with submission of tissues to an approved diagnostic laboratory at the exhibitor's expense.

Commingle (as defined by Arkansas scrapie regulation) of sheep or goats of different flock status as defined by the voluntary Flock certification Program (vFcP) is prohibited and must be reported to the vFcP state official and state veterinarian.

No sheep or goats showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection, evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state- federal personnel.

Arkansas Camelids

1. Individually identified and certificate of veterinary inspection within 90 days of exhibition.
2. Registration papers when accompanied by registry photo- graphs of the animal are acceptable identification.

Arkansas Horses

Negative EIA test required within the past 12 months for all animals over 6 months of age.

Nursing foals under 6 months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams Photocopies of the test papers will not be accepted; carbon copies are acceptable.

There will be an Open and County Fair Division, so all entries are welcome. Entries in County Fair Division must reside in or attend a school or 4-H program in Cross, Jackson or Woodruff County

Entries are open to any equine species, you may participate with a Horse, Mule or Donkey in any pleasure or speed class.

All entries must conform with current Coggins Testing Requirements of Arkansas.

Queens Contest will consist of Horsemanship and Interview. Pre-entry deadline required.

1. Class Payouts and Supplemental Premiums to be paid by check, available for pickup with fair premium checks or will be mailed.

2. Pre-Entry fees \$10/class. (County Fair entries maximum entry paid is 5 classes, all additional classes are free} Online pre-entries due 9/13 by noon.

Late entries accepted at \$20/class day of show. Pleasure till 11am. Speed till 3:30.

3. Negative Coggins test required on all ponies and horses. (current within 12-months)

4. Contestants do not have to ride their own horse.

5. Queen, Princess and Buckaroo (rules same as Arkansas State Fair) classes. A contestant can only win the event two times and not in consecutive years. Also contestant that wins **MUST** be present at the parade and show the following year.

6. No studs may be entered. No studs over 6-months-old on the grounds.

7. Ribbons awarded at show. Premium checks picked up Sunday 1:30 pm – 3:00 pm.

8. Horses dismissed at conclusion of their entered events.

9. Pewee, Youth and Open showmanship classes for all exhibitors are free.
